We hope that our next **Parents' Weekend** over the long weekend of **9/10 August** will be attended by all parents as we already have the framework in place for a very interactive time together, about which details will be provided closer to the time. Right now, we hope to hold the finals of the Internal Music Competition on that weekend. In addition, I dearly need time to speak with the parent body as a whole, something I have not been able to do since my arrival here. I believe there needs to be an opportunity for parents to meet on common concerns, so that there is a collective voice feeding back to the school. In addition, we have some very exciting speakers prepared to talk on boy-relevant topics, who would be well worth hearing.

Having asked for feedback from the Parents' Association on the weekend just past, we will be attempting to make slight modifications to the programme, which will allow all the above to be catered for without parents having to incur great expense on accommodation, nor excessive time off work.

Watch this space.

Our Life Orientation, **Berg and Beyond** programme, is scheduled to take place on **Thursday 28 June**. This term we are devoting time to issues of sexuality and have invited some very good speakers to come and address the boys.

Debbie Butt, a parent of the School and the San Sister at the SA Jockey Academy, will spend time with the younger boys, dealing with basic questions and answers pertaining to the facts of life. Boys at this age are naturally curious and she will structure her presentation to deal appropriately and sensitively with any issues raised.

Then we are being joined by Tim Jarvis, the School Counsellor at Michaelhouse and Diane Pickford, the Chaplain at St John's DSG in Pietermaritzburg, whom I recently had the pleasure of hearing speak on addiction.

Tim will be addressing the boys on a topic he has shared at a number of boys' schools. It has to do with a host of topics, including drug and alcohol abuse, media issues (including movies, gaming and adverts), competition and dominance, language to and around women, and body image.



Online gaming, gambling and accessing pornography have become massive problems for schools in recent years. So addictive are these pursuits, that girls and boys often stay awake until the wee hours of the morning involved in screen time. They then arrive at school, tired and listless, and very often fall asleep at their desks during class. Di Pickford will pick up on these topics in her discussion with the boys, arguing that cell phones are addictive and that uncontrolled access can have severe negative implications for the youth.

On this very issue, the *Sydney Morning Herald* newspaper recently floated an article on the dangers of cell phones in schools. I have paraphrased the pertinent details below...

"Smartphones should be banned at primary level and high schools should act quickly to teach tech self-discipline to stem the damage they are causing children's learning," warns world-renowned Finnish education expert, Pasi Sahlberg, of the University of New South Wales.

Sahlberg says smartphones are distracting students from reading, school-related work, physical activity, and high-quality sleep and he cites them as one of the main reasons why Australia and similar countries are sliding down Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) rankings.

Supporting Sahlberg's view, the Australian Education Minister added that some primary schools were already prohibiting access to smartphones for non-educational purposes, adding that, even in the case of high school students, the basic premise should be that there is no role for smartphones inside the school gate unless the device is needed for academic reasons.

Teachers Federation President, Maurie Mulheron, said smartphones were dominating students' lives "to an extraordinary degree." She adds, "They are both psychologically and emotionally connected to these devices - adults are too, but for kids it's particularly powerful."

Sahlberg says further that the time youngsters spend daily, watching the screens of digital devices, has exploded. "Screen time and the inconvenient consequences - psychological, social and physical - have affected students' learning in schools, especially reading, mathematics and science...that all require concentration, attention, and perseverance to do well," he states.

We believe it is important that despite the intermittent protestations by some boys over our cell phone policy, the implications of unrestricted access to cell phones is clear. In support of this, I had a number of conversations with parents during MiMs on this matter and without exception, every parent supported our policy and added that it was not out of line with restrictions placed on the boys when at home.



I would dearly like Di Pickford to address parents on screen addiction at our next parents' weekend. There is much to be learned, especially if you, as a parent, are part of the Millennial Generation (under the age of 35-40 years of age). If this is you, you have a predisposition to engage with your phone as much as your children!

We recently undertook an online survey of parents, as part of the Independent Quality Assurance Agency's (IQAA) evaluation of our school. I share with you, the summary of what the External Moderator made of your input...

By and large the comments are positive. One needs to remember that the school has come through a trying time with a change in leadership and some of that is reflected in the results.

One can usually expect some form of discrepancy between comments and actual results and that is borne out in these results. Where one finds concordance between comments and collated results, this usually indicates a real issue and not simply a perception or ill-informed opinion.

Parents

By and large the results are pretty positive, but there are commonalities between a number of the parent responses and pupil responses. One of the major issues for parents seems to be communication. You might wish to identify a key group of parents (a small group: 4-6) and ask them to respond more fully including recommendations for improvement.

One issue which surfaced especially among pupils, but also amongst other groups too is the state of the physical plant of the school. It might be fruitful to convene a small workgroup, including key maintenance staff, to investigate fully and draw up a priority list for renovation.

Given that it is difficult to get parents together, we have looked closely at the issues raised. There were no surprises. This is what a scan of the results revealed:

Parents Gr 4-6.

- Poor communication from school to parents.
- My child does not have someone he can speak to about issues.
- Equal opportunities for all boys do not exist.

Parents Gr 7-9.

- Poor academic support offered.
- My child does not have someone he can speak to about issues.
- Ineffective use of technology.

In an effort to improve communication outgoing from the school this year, we introduced the *In Tune* newsflash every Tuesday, which has received very positive feedback. This is designed to provide a weekly update of events, plans and information to parents specifically and not the general public who might access our website.

We have also attempted to make the *Take Note* more newsworthy and have included profiles of the staff, articles of interest and as many photos of the boys in action as we can find each week.

We do need to pay closer attention to long-term planning and short-term execution and how and when this is communicated to parents.

We note the concerns around academic support but do offer four hours each week of after-school, academic support. The need for a remedial teacher has been identified, which we would ideally like to see in place by January 2019.


Parents across the school highlighted the need for a school counsellor, no longer a "nice-to-have," in any school. We shall do what we can do to appoint a counsellor in the New Year.

On the matter of Technology, we have placed an order for 30 new computers and await the arrival of desks, which will allow us to set up the IT Room to accommodate a full class of boys, each at his own computer. We are also exploring additional, supervised access time to this facility. My hope is that the newly-fitted IT laboratory will be fully functional by the start of Term 3.

John Alexander, the IQAA Mentor spent this past Wednesday with us to get a feel for the school. It was a valuable exercise, as he was able to meet with some of the senior boys, spend time observing both academic and music lessons and talk to members of the staff.

As we are still in the process of completing the audit, it is difficult to provide much more information than I already have done, but a formal report completes the process, details of which I shall happily make available. It takes a community to make a school successful, meaning input from teachers, boys, parents and other governing and representative bodies will be essential to take the school to the pinnacle we envision for it. I know I can count on your assistance, each step of the way.

STORIES FROM THE PAST

THE "TERRABULL NOOSE"

It was the first week in March in 1972, and the Künkel choir was charging onto the bus like bulls in a Pamplona stampede. There was always excitement at the start of a tour, but this one was extra special. It was a four week tour to the eastern and north eastern parts of the country, including a four night stopover in LM. (Now Maputo). We'd been rehearsing three hours a day since January and this was D Day. 'Künki' had us run the number check to see if all were present and we reached thirty-three, without skipping a digit, in a demisemiquaver. He nodded - apparently that's how Germans smile – and Gilbert drove off.

Grant Steele and Garth Küsel were looking forward to consuming prawns. Peter Malherbe was telling everyone the history of all the towns we were going to visit and Etienne Jansen and Ian Searle were excited about playing on the beach. But for most of us, going to a bullfight in LM was the big prize. How a bunch of eleven and twelve year olds were going to be allowed into a bullfight no-one actually knew, but someone had mentioned that we might be guests of honour; and a schoolboy rumour quickly becomes a schoolboy fact.

Gianni Loppo had taught us all how to shout Olé: Being Italian he obviously knew how it was done. Johan Griessel had perfected the art of swishing the cape and knew exactly what to expect, because he'd rehearsed with Graham Dendy and Nico Els. (Being Free Staters, they knew all about bulls.) The Warren twins boasted that they could easily outfox any bull by simply running in different directions, but Colin Searle didn't believe that'd work, which caused a rather heated debate; while Marius Botha was doing something he wasn't allowed to do. (He was always doing something he wasn't allowed to do.)

Finally, after ten days and ten shows we entered the gates of the Komatipoort border post. Künki and Uncle Graham (Walker) got off the bus and went into the offices, and the long wait began. It carried on, and on, and on and the longer it did, the more impatient we became. Steve Olivier and Cedric Cullingworth cleverly passed the time by playing chess, while a group of us chatted and clowned about. Mark Ching mentioned that he'd been to Mozambique three times before. Not to be upstaged, I responded that this was my 13th visit, which was greeted with a chorus of: "Sprout! Sprout! " (The then term for 'liar, liar'.) When Deon van der Walt asked a border official if he'd ever seen me before, I thought I was busted. But by the grace of God the man looked at me for a while and asked me if I was a Hellberg? I enthusiastically confirmed, and for a moment I thought my fib had been ratified. But, when the lads realised that the man was from my home town, and knew my Dad, the cries of "Sprout, sprout" started up again, just as a grave looking Künki and Uncle Graham came back to the bus. "Boyss." He said. "I haff terrabull noose."

Due to some administrative error, or maybe it was political (we never found out), our Mozambique leg had been cancelled. We were devastated. Gilbert started what felt like a hearse now, and after spluttering and coughing a few times, the bus slowly trundled back towards Nelspruit. For the first time on the tour no one said a word. The surrounding veld which had seemed so pretty and green ten minutes before now seemed dull and dry.

We hadn't gone far though when Roy Sturgeon shouted: "They're coming after us!" We all turned around to see a white Chev Kommando with two gents in three piece suits, dark glasses, and moustaches, flashing their lights and waving at us. If you think the opening bars of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus are loud, you should've heard the cheer from 33 choir boys. Obviously the powers that be had had a change of heart and these walrus lookalikes were the angels delivering the message.

They overtook and pulled us off. The cheers got even louder and then everything suddenly hushed as life seemed to go into slow motion. It was like a cowboy gunfight. The walruses got out. Künki got off the bus. We craned our necks, waiting, in an....tici......pation. Walrus One said something and opened the boot. Künki nodded his head. Was that a smile we all thought? Walrus Two spoke and after what felt like four double breves, but was only a crotchet, he produced Künki's briefcase. Our conductor had forgotten it at the border post, and they were merely being boy scouts.

A week later we were performing in Komatipoort. Gianni Loppo was my host, and he was a train driver on the LM line, who knew all the border officials rather well. So, on the Sunday morning after we had sung in the local church, he took us to the shunting yard and let us drive a diesel locomotive. Then he took us into Mozambique and treated us to lunch in Ressano Garcia; the little town just beyond the border. It was extremely Spartan and I had peri-peri chicken and roast potatoes for lunch, which started my love affair with Portuguese cuisine. So, despite not getting to LM, I had been in Mozambique (without a passport), eaten Portuguese food, driven a train, sung 26 concerts in 26 days in 18 towns with 22 standing ovations - the remaining 4 were in churches where applause wasn't acceptable and, I learned that one shouldn't tell fibs to upstage one's schoolmates.

After the tour our parents picked us up and took us home for the Easter holidays. Back in Dundee I bumped into one of my chums from junior school.

"Hey Hellberg," he said. "I hear you chaps didn't get to Mozambique?"

"Nope; which is a pity 'cause I really wanted to see a bullfight. How're things going here?"

"Fantastic." He said. "Mrs Abrahams had her birthday last week and she brought her record player and cake and cream soda and we danced for the last two periods on Friday. No school work. It was groovy. And then on Tuesday before that the teachers had a meeting, so we all went home at 12 o' clock. It was lekker. Bet you're sorry you went to that choir place." He quipped triumphantly.

Now here was my dilemma. Should I tell the truth or should I break my resolution and tell a fib?

"Ja" I said. "Seems I really missed something."


